

# Can new energy vehicles have a battery warranty and how long

How long do electric car battery warranties last?

Electric car battery warranties often have the longest coverage of all the warranty types available. Most manufacturers offer warranties that last eight years or 100,000 miles, whichever comes first.

What is an EV battery warranty?

The specifics of an EV battery warranty can vary between different manufacturers and models. Typically, battery warranties have their own time and mileage limits, distinct from the overall electric vehicle warranty. Federal regulations require that car manufacturers provide coverage for electric car batteries for a minimum duration of eight years.

Do electric car batteries have a warranty?

Beginning with the 2027 model year, the EPA will require the high-voltage battery systems in EVs and PHEVs to carry an eight-year/80,000-mile warranty. California has laws for electric car battery warranty coverage that provide even more protection than the rules set by the federal government.

How long does a battery last on a new car?

The next time you want to buy an electric car, truck, or SUV, it's worth knowing what level of coverage it may or may not have on the battery. Generally, you can expect a battery on a new vehicle from the dealer to offer about 10 years of manufacturer coverage in the event of an error that is their fault.

Should you replace an EV battery out of warranty?

If you find yourself in the unfortunate position of having to replace an EV battery out of warranty, it'll likely cost a great deal. However, since EVs are still relatively new, few batteries have been replaced outside of the standard eight-year warranty.
