

Can Burundi access energy?

This article will highlight challenges relating to accessing energy in Burundi and the early successes of some solutions. Most Burundians live an agrarian lifestyle; approximately 80% of the population is employed in the agricultural sector and more than 87% of the population lives in rural areas.
